Personal Workplace Disaster Supplies Kit

You might be confined for several hours, perhaps overnight, maybe even evacuated. The following supplies are recommended.



Flashlight with extra batteries Use the flashlight to find

your way if the power is out. Do not use candles or any other open flame for emergency lighting.



Battery-powered radio

News about the emergency may change

rapidly as events unfold. You also will be concerned about family and friends in the area. Radio reports will give information about the areas most affected.



Food

Enough non-perishable food to sustain you for at

least one day (three meals), is suggested. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking, and little or no water. The following items are suggested: • Ready-to-eat canned meals, meats, fruits, and vegetables. • Canned juices. • High-energy foods (granola bars, energy bars, etc.).



Water

Keep at least one gallon of water available, or more if you are on medications that require water or that increase thirst. Store water in plastic containers such as soft drink bottles. Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles.

Medications

Include usual nonprescription medications that you take, including pain relievers, stomach remedies, etc. If you use prescription medications, keep at least three-

day's supply of these medications at your workplace. Consult with your physician or pharmacist how these medications should be stored, and your employer about storage concerns.



First Aid Supplies

If your employer does not provide first aid

supplies, have the following essentials:

- (20) adhesive bandages, various sizes.
- (1) 5" x 9" sterile dressing.
- (1) conforming roller gauze bandage.
- (2) triangular bandages.
- (2) 3 x 3 sterile gauze pads.
- (2) 4 x 4 sterile gauze pads.
- (1) roll 3" cohesive bandage.
- (2) germicidal hand wipes or waterless alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- (6) antiseptic wipes.
- (2) pair large medical grade nonlatex gloves

Adhesive tape, 2" width. Anti-bacterial ointment. Cold pack.

Scissors (small, personal). Tweezers.

CPR breathing barrier, such as a face shield



Tools and Supplies

- Emergency "space" blanket (mylar).
- Paper plates and cups, plastic utensils
- Non-electric can opener.
- Personal hygiene items, including a toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, brush, soap, contact lens supplies, and feminine supplies.
- Map with routes to get home.
- Plastic garbage bags, ties (for personal sanitation uses).

- Include at least one complete change of clothing and footwear, including a long sleeved shirt and long pants, and jacket, as well as closed-toed shoes or boots.
- If you wear glasses, keep an extra pair with your workplace disaster supplies.



Communication tools

 An emergency contacts list (Make sure your work

has at least five different ways to contact you - think friends, family, cell phone, landline, extra email address. Be sure to update your emergency contact info if you've just moved or changed numbers.)

• Cell phone and charger.



Money and information

· Have small bills and change for when power

might be out.

 Make sure your work information is backed up somewhere else.



General Information

 Your kit should be portable in case you need

to evacuate quickly • Your kit should be adjusted based on your own personal needs. • Do not include candles, weapons, toxic chemicals, or controlled drugs unless prescribed by a physician.

 Know what protective actions should be taken in different types of emergencies.
